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CURATOR'S NOTE

hey do things differently in Zurich.
This is evident when walking
Bahnhofstrasse, the city's self-styled
millionaire mile, or when browsing
the restaurants and bars of the Niederdorf,
Lindenhof or Zurich West, Switzerland's
trendiest neighborhood.

Situated between Uetliberg mountain and Lake Zurich, and divided by the Limmat and Sihl Rivers, the city's location is key to its appeal. Here, hiking, biking and cold-water plunges are as common as shopping in watch salons and chocolate emporiums.

Zurich also enjoys creative freedom like nowhere else in the Alps: it's home to more than 50 museums, 100 art galleries and a wedding-cake opera house. Flashy displays of wealth are as everyday as you'd expect from a global investment banking capital, but then, as they say in Zurich, more really can be more. – *Mike MacEacheran*




CREATIVE CAPITAL

Often regarded as one of the world's most fashion-forward cities by style bibles *Monocle* and *Wallpaper*, Zurich is nothing if not a crucible of art, design and cultural trends. Here are places not to be missed during your visit



KUNSTHAUS

Art-lover or not, no visit to Zurich is complete without a visit to this contemporary culture magnet. Highlights include the David Chipperfield-designed extension, which has made it the largest art museum in Switzerland and the world's largest collection of avant-garde Dada pieces.


A collection with many masterpieces created during the early 1900s also features Intérieur à Collioure (La Sieste), 1905 by Henri Matisse





GROSSMUNSTER & FRAUMUNSTER CHURCHES

Of Zurich's holy trinity of postcard-perfect churches – the other being St Peterskirche, with Europe's largest clock face – these two monumental religious houses flank opposite banks of the Limmat River. Fraumünster's magnificent stained glass windows created by artist Marc Chagall deserve more than a few minutes of your time.

SWISS NATIONAL MUSEUM

Also known as the Schweizerisches Nationalmuseum, this colossal heavyweight chronicles everything you'd want to know about Switzerland's cultural history, starting from the country's founding to present day. Housed in a fairytalelike castle right next to Zurich Main Station, "Simply Zurich" is a free exhibition that playfully showcases the city's rich past through 60 objects.




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

NIEDERDORF & LINDENHOF

Despite its medieval streets and squares, these two neighborhoods north of Lake Zurich are home to stylish art establishments. A stroll through the nucleus of Zurich's artfilled Old Town leads from zigzagging lanes to the spirit-clear Limmat. This is where you will find loads of avant-garde galleries (including Cabaret Voltaire) and little art stores, as well as candybox clock towers and urban beach clubs.

SPOTLIGHT ON: CABARET VOLTAIRE

Zurich gave the world Dada, the bold counterculture art movement born in 1916. This art space-cum-café on Spiegelgasse is where writer Hugo Ball founded the artistic revolution, and even today, it hosts avant-garde art exhibits and live jazz, plus defiant humor, debates and temporary exhibitions in the cellar.

The Biggest Party in Town

The only time in the year the city goes completely wild



August and is acknowledged to be the world's largest dance parade. This noholds-barred techno and electro gathering draws the city's most up-for-it crowd and explodes with color, glitter, disco balls and pure hedonism. Imagine hundreds of international artists, mobile DJ booths and seven stages anchored around the lake shore and you're still only halfway there.

If These Walls Could Talk

Zurich-based Thai researcher Fikri Pitsuwan shares his fascination with guild houses. These establishments have been around since the Middle Ages and were instrumental in governing Zurich.


"If you're into heritage and history, check out the medieval guild houses that have now become restaurants serving traditional Zurich food. Known as Zunfthaus, these were meeting places for professional associations of skilled tradesmen, organized to protect their interests and ensure high standards. They are a testament to the guilds' influence in shaping Zurich's economic and social development. Even now the atmosphere is just full of history. Beside the classic dishes, I really like the ornate decorations with wooden panels, carpeted floor and, of course, the guild emblem."





CELESTIAL CUISINE

These top tables with Michelin stars and cult followings offer exceptional dining experiences – some medieval townhouses in the heart of town, others with a spectacular backdrop of Lake Zurich




HAUS HILTL

Don't be fooled by the Swiss' love of veal and cheese in all its forms. This cult black book address is the world's oldest vegetarian and vegan restaurant, opening in 1898 – and it's also now home to the country's first vegetarian butcher.



RESTAURANT PAVILLON

Baur au Lac needs no introduction as one of Zurich's most distinguished hotels and its signature restaurant is the perfect metaphor for the clientele it feeds — it's a two-Michelinstar showstopper, offering haute cuisine classics and sevencourse tasting menus.



MAISON MANESSE

Another Michelin-star wonder, this time in an unassuming location west of the main city. This culinary maison marries fine dining with rustic décor — vegetarian and plant-based tasting menus underline the chef's creative bent.



WIDDER RESTAURANT

The essential ingredient at this see-and-be-seen brasserie inside the five-star Widder Hotel is chef Stefan Heilemann's menu informed by local produce and years of globe-trotting. This is the table to book for a taste of exquisitely seasoned pigeon and Norway lobster, right in the heart of Zurich's Old Town.



BLINDE KUH

You certainly don't eat with your eyes here. This cult restaurant operates completely in the dark, with the restaurant's charitable foundation employing blind and partiallysighted locals to feed and serve you European fare such as braised beef cheeks and king oyster risotto. You can literally "remain in the dark" with their surprise menu - the mystery is revealed at the end.

Kay Keusen

Founder of Taucherli



Keusen is the brains behind this bean-to-bar start-up that first sparked to life in a rundown garage in District 5. Now, he runs a fullyfledged, Wonkastyle chocolate factory and has multiple awards on his shelves for the brand's Cameroon 70%, Nicaragua 72% and Colombia 77% bars.

Laura Schälchli

Co-founder of laflor



Selling her first chocolate five years ago, Schälchli now runs an innovative singleorigin chocolate manufactory, working with fair trade suppliers in Ecuador and Venezuela and importing its Colombian cocoa by zero-emissions sailing ship, Tres Hombres. Look out for the Goat's Milk Chocolate with Caramel Crunch or Dark Salt Chocolate 69% Rio Sinu.

Fränzi Akert

Founder of Garçoa



A trained cheesemaker and agricultural scientist, Akert now obsesses over cocoa beans and bean-to-bar manufacture. Her pitch is an organic, fair and transparent chocolate company, and the cocoa "terroir" is at the heart of her chocolate's flavor profile.

ADVENTURES AROUND LAKE ZURICH

A love of the outdoors is in the DNA of those who call Zurich home – and with a matrix of forested hills, two rivers and a lake all within easy reach of the center, it's little wonder why. Discover the city's natural attractions through a local's eyes



HIKE THE UETLIBERG

A 30-minute ride from Zurich Main Station will take you to this hiking haven situated on the west of Lake Zurich. Rising to only 870m, Zurich's panoramic mountain is a baby in Alpine terms, but what it lacks in height it makes for in undiluted spectacle: from the top, there are forested trails to follow, a lookout tower to climb and a toboggan run to whoosh down in winter.



Curator's Note

Tackle the tower on the mountain too and you'll be 900m above sea level – and rewarded with magnificent views of the city and lake.




WALK BAHNHOFSTRASSE

A riot of consumerism by design, Zurich's showpiece boulevard is a glitzy kilometer-long stretch of prestigious luxury brands that rivals anything you'd find in New York, Paris or Tokyo. Here the sport is window shopping, or what the Swiss call *lädele*.



? Did you know?

During winter, this street is the place to enjoy a cup of hot chocolate or mulled wine.



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Curator's Note

Those who don't SUP can still get their peace and quiet at this promenade, as a path along the canal is lined with willowy trees.

SUP THE SCHANZENGRABEN

Part of the city's medieval moat system, the Schanzengraben is a highlight of a SUP tour of the city's waterways and quaysides. Paddling beside vibrant blue swimming spots and beneath a slew of bridges, you could, for the briefest moment, feel like you're in Venice.

BOAT RIDE TO UFENAU


This idyllic nature reserve and small island on Lake Zurich is bypassed by most visitors, but hides grapevines and timestopped churches: to land here is to almost travel back in time.

The first Christian church was built on this island as early as the 7th century.


CYCLE THE LIMMAT RIVER PATH


Start your ride from the north of the city at Zurich Hauptbahnhof, the largest railway station in Switzerland. Follow the pedestrian-only pathway and you'll encounter street art murals, a food market and bucolic park. Crucially, you'll also see a part of the city few others do, as fewer tourists venture here.



Here for a swim

In a city famous for urban dips, Zurich has no shortages of lidos and historic bath houses. Unlike mere outdoor swimming pools, lidos are usually situated near another body of water, such as the beach or river. If jumping into a public body of water right in the heart of town is on your list, Limmat's riverside lidos have cult followings – some even turn into bars come nighttime. The vibe is often pre- or post-work fluster and bluster, but many are quiet bubbles of contemplation and there are at least a dozen to choose from. One stand out is Frauenbad at Stadthausquai, an Art Nouveau cabana exclusively for women.

La Réserve Eden au Lac Zurich


Shuttered for a two-year overhaul, this iconic Zurich address has been partly reimagined by French industrial designer Philippe Starck. There are a multitude of reasons to check-in, but the main draws are the prime lakeview suites and Japanese-Peruvian cuisine at La Muña restaurant.





Ruby Mimi

Opened in 2021, this design hotel now inhabits one of Zurich's first cinemas – setting the scene for a mix of movie set glamor, Art Nouveau décor, and vintage camera, lighting and costume props.









Ambassador Hotel

Zurich's newest hotel – opened this spring – is amped-up for the jet-set crowd: the design is Neo-Baroque, the lobby doubles as a Champagne bar and the rooftop overlooks the swish Opera House.
